Bar 1250 wins Reid trophy

But best prize in softball tournament is \$10,000 raised for Mackay Centre

The sixth annual Greenfield Park/Mackay Centre charity softball tournament reached another successful climax last Sunday with Bar 1250 from St. Bruno capturing top honors with a 6-3 win over P.C. Recycling.

For its A division triumph, Bar 1250 took home the coveted Michael Reid Memorial Trophy.

But the weekend's biggest winner — once again — was charity.

Tourney organizer Frank Reid estimates the 32-team tourney raised more than \$10,000 for deaf and crippled children at the Mackay Centre in Montreal.

Over the past six years this fun-filled charity event has raised more than \$65,000 for the Mackay Centre.

The local Greenfield Park Legion team won its first-ever title by eking out a 3-2 win over Provigo in the consolation final at Pierre Laporte Park.

"We couldn't believe it," chuckled Frank Reid, tournament organizer and member of the Legion squad. "We finally won something!"

The highlight of the softball tournament was Saturday's annual exhibition game between a National Hockey League celebrity softball team and the tournament's organizing committee.

The NHLers — led by former South Shore residents Garry Galley and Steve Kasper — defeated the organizers 7-3 in a game enjoyed by all.

One of the biggest attractions was former Montreal Canadiens' goalie Lorne (Gump) Worsley.

The Gumper was restricted to coaching duties for the NHL team, but that, apparently, was alright by the dozens of fans who hounded him for autographs.

The Gazette's editorial team was soundly beaten in both its games, despite the heroics of two South Shore residents, clutch-hitting Stu Cowan and mound ace Dave Peters.

Reid concluded by saying the tournament was another success.

"Everything went off with a hitch. We had a good turnout at the dance on Friday, and the weather was great all weekend.
